HANDY CB HINTS

We all could benefit from some guidance in the use of our CB's. It has been obvious that there are many of us out there that have trouble getting out or hearing what's going on. Each month in the Caravaner there will be some useful information for everyone that uses a CB, be it here at a caravan or out on the road. With increased knowledge come happier campers.

- 1. **Always key the Mic before starting to talk** Sounds elementary, but "familiarity breeds contempt". We all have this problem at some point, but we all know those first few syllables are important. First press the key **then** talk.
- 2. **Don't talk before the other guy unkeys.** The radio can not receive when the Mic is keyed. He won't hear you.
- 3. **Leave a second, or two, or three of quiet time before responding back.** This will help with giving the other person time to unkey or to add a second thought. But far more important - this will allow emergency traffic to break in.
- 4. **When calling on the CB, call more than once.** Initially call the person's name **twice** and ID yourself. i.e. "John Doe - short pause - John Doe this is Jane Smith, do you have a copy?" If there's no response call one more time. Too many times I've heard what I think is a call when I'm talking to someone else in the rig, or at night with the blanket over the front of the cab thus muffling the CB, while watching TV or listening to music; by the time I can find the remote to mute, the call is gone. Give time for the person you're calling time to hear and to respond.



Lake Perris Wildlife

Cool, but clear and dry, with warm afternoons sounds pretty good for winter in the desert. And it was at Lake Perris for the humans who had access to a good water supply and adequate food. Wildlife is going to suffer greatly if Southern California doesn't get an appreciable amount of rain soon. When the flora suffers, so does the fauna; an inadequate food supply for the smaller creatures will cause a decrease in the birthrate and predators higher on the food chain will have to range further, perhaps entering suburban areas.



Mother Nature took reports of a roadrunner, coyotes (as many as four in one sighting), a barn owl, a bobcat (this from a Camp Host), Say's phoebe, bushtits, quail, small flocks of large ravens, black phoebes (wearing their tuxedos) and California towhees. Small mammals present were bunnies, ground squirrels, raccoon prints in the dumpsters and on the trail, and the smell of mephitis (the stripedskunk). On the Walk down to the lake, our group of Lazy Daze birdwatchers encountered a pair of flickers several times; small flocks of white-crowned sparrows and a killdeer who seemed to pose for us while a red-tailed hawk soared above. A mockingbird crossed our path intent on getting a moth or caterpillar in the bush.

The winter defoliation of the deciduous trees gave us the opportunity to spot empty nests – three in one tree. The largest might be a raven's nest, while out farther on a thinner branch was a middle size nest. The smallest one was very different; it was woven from fibers and grasses and included a bright green filament that was too long and dangled, twisting in the breeze, from this creation that looked like a stretchy old sock. Then under the eave of the restroom was a mud and twig nest possibly made by a black phoebe. No twisting in the wind here and it also had protection from any future rain

Two years ago when I was here last, there was an active great blue heron nest near the lake high in the eucalyptus tree. This time no herons, but a second nest is there, also empty. On the water we identified cormorants, coots, several lesser scaup, a few gulls, a ruddy duck in winter clothes, and way in the distance a large flock of white shorebirds of some kind.

Other evidence of animal activity included scattered shells from freshwater clams, footprints, and scat with hair fibers and pieces of bone and large white blotches of guano anywhere the herons and egrets can find to roost. Some of you heard the coyotes yodeling.

Two nights in a row as I came back to my rig from the campfire, I approached my door and spotted that cute black kitty with two long white stripes down its back. Afraid to move for fear of retaliation, I kept my flashlight on it until it calmly turned around and walked on down the road. Lucky me, twice.

We'll be back at Lake Perris next month when there will be nesting behavior to watch. At Buena Vista, keep an eye out for the muskrat. Hopefully, the great horned owl will visit again at dusk in the top of the tallest trees. Remember, keep your eyes and ears open and be my field reporters.



STROKE

Remember The 1st Three Letters **S T R O K E**.....
.....it could save some ones life!

A neurologist says that if he can get to a stroke victim within three hours he can totally reverse the effects of a stroke. The trick is getting a stroke recognized, diagnosed, and then getting the patient medically cared for within three (3) hours.

Sometimes symptoms of a stroke are difficult to identify. Unfortunately, the lack of awareness spells disaster. The stroke victim may suffer severe brain damage when people nearby fail to recognize the symptoms of a stroke. Now doctors say a bystander can recognize a stroke by asking three (3) simple questions:

THREE STEPS IN RECOGNIZING A STROKE

An easy way to remember the "3" steps in recognizing a stroke is to be aware of what **S T R** specify.

- S** Ask the individual to **SMILE**.
- T** Ask the person to **TALK** - speak a simple sentence *coherently* i.e. It is sunny out today.
- R** Ask him or her to **RAISE BOTH ARMS**.

Another 'sign' of a stroke is to ask the person to 'stick' out their tongue; if the tongue is 'crooked', if it goes to one side or the other this is also an indication of a stroke.

If he or she has trouble with ANY ONE of these tasks, call 911 immediately and describe the symptoms to the dispatcher.

Tech Talk Article 21

12 Volt Electrical Topics

Chassis Battery - At the January Caravan at Lake Perris, one rig experienced electrical problems and was unable to start the engine. The battery gave no prior indication of problems and had just started the engine a several times in preparation of departing. We measured the voltage across the battery terminals and found it to be above 12 volts. The “eye” was green indicating that the “cell” was charged. There was no voltage at the main power distribution panel under the hood where the big fuses reside. At this point our attention was drawn away from the battery as the source of the problem. The headlights were dead. Then we opened the cab door and the dome light was very dim and fading so we measured the voltage across the battery and found it to be way below 12 Volts. This “load test” indicated that the battery had an internal short. The battery was replaced and the problem was solved. When replacing the battery, check the Owner’s Manual for the Cold Cranking Amps (CCA) rating of the battery. Always buy a replacement with an equal or higher CCA rating. The battery in question was the original battery and was about six years old. In earlier times, a battery was a relatively expensive item, but now costs less than a full tank of gas. Replacing the chassis battery about every five years is a prudent way of minimizing the chances of getting stranded by a dead battery.

Coach Batteries - I replaced my original Trojan 105 batteries with Trojan 145 batteries before heading for the Golden Caravan at Cheyenne. My original batteries were almost five years old and I had noticed a very gradual decline in performance while dry camping. Like tires, lead-acid batteries seem to have a useful life of about five years. Replacing them at this five year interval seems like a way to minimize the inconvenience of being subjected to an unexpected battery failure.

12 Volt Interior Lighting - I added several additional “factory” lighting fixtures under the cabinets in my rig next to the florescent lamps. Wiring them was quite easy once the florescent fixture was temporarily lowered out of the way. I found some neat LED circuit boards that have a bayonet connector that fits into the existing bulb socket in the fixture at www.superbrightleds.com for about \$15 each. I cut strips of sheet metal, bent them into a squashed “L” shape. I attached the strips to the fixture with double sided tape and then attached the circuit boards to the sheet metal the same way. The light has a cool bluish cast but has a very low amperage draw. I replaced my outside porch light bulb with this scheme to lower the amperage draw while I am dry camping. Many of these circuit boards have failed over time. Some of the individual LEDs have started to flash intermittently or have gone dead. As the boards fail, I replace them with lower wattage bulbs used for “instrument lights”. I have appreciated the lower wattage bulb I installed in the original light fixture over the throne in my Rear-Bath. No longer am I blinded by the bright light during the middle of the night. Hopefully the LED circuit board lights will be more reliable in the future so I can go back to LEDs in the “factory” fixtures.

Adding reading lamps to supplement the “factory” lighting is practical Do-It-Yourself project. One example is in the “Files” Section of the “Techsnoz” Yahoo Group in the “ReadingLights.pdf” article. This article shows how to remove the cabinet bottoms, run the wires, and install the lamp fixtures. A source for LED lamp fixtures is www.swego.com Item #9006 Tube 9006 LED Reading Light in white, 1 watt, \$37. A source for halogen lamp fixtures is www.campingworld.com Item # 23843 in brass, 19 Watts, \$35. Note that the halogen lamps can get very hot. Try to experience both types of lighting before purchasing and installing a lamp.

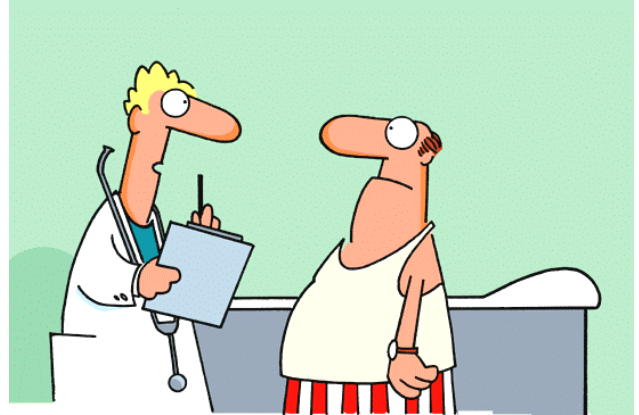
TWELVE MENTAL AEROBICS TO HELP AGE-PROOF YOUR MEMORY

1. Warm up your memory each morning by reviewing the day of the week, the date, and items on your "to do" list for the day.
2. Learn something new every day. It can be a name, a vocabulary word, a phone number, etc. At the end of the day review today's and the previous day's learning's.
3. Organize your things and your life. Well-organized people have better memories than those with cluttered, chaotic lives.
4. Refine your five senses. Become aware of, and distinguish among: tastes, smells, feel, sight, and sound of everyday things around you.
5. Work on eye-hand coordination through hobbies, crafts, and sports. Motor memory is the last to go. Remember: "Use it or lose it."
6. Develop a new interest. It can be fine wines, classical music, computer literacy, or a new author. Keep your neurons active by expanding your interests.
7. Build confidence in your memory. Think of things you do remember. Don't beat yourself up for occasional-lapses. We all have them.
8. Use a calendar to record upcoming events. Also, after an event add some brief notes to the date. It may come in handy in the future.
9. Find occasions to discuss a film or book with friends. See how well you can recall the plot, characters, setting, etc.
10. Select and read books that are thought provoking. Avoid "page turners" that are soon forgotten.
11. Work at forgetting troubling or distressing memories from the past by ignoring them. Make room for positive present day memories.
12. Memorize something you like, such as a poem, song, book passage, or recipe. Review this in your mind while getting dressed. Check yourself for accuracy.
