IMPORTANT CB NEWS

While at Live Oak, there was a problem with someone other than Lazy Dazers using Channel 30 making it difficult for us to transmit and receive; they were very close-by and could not be tuned out. As much as we would like it to be, Channel 30 is NOT our own private channel – the CB channels are open for everyone's use; we share them with the world so to speak. It seemed apparent that the continued conversations were coming from the nearby golf course so I spoke with the manager and he assured me that he would have his workers go to another channel. Unfortunately that was not where the interference was coming from and the talking continued. After a considerable amount of time the other users realized that we were interfering with their transmissions and went to another channel.

Long ago the club designated an *Alternate Channel* if and when such a problem occurred. With so many newer members, little knowledge of what channel and the procedures of notifying them has not been kept current.

PLEASE be aware of the following if we should ever have to use the Alternate CB Channel:

- #1 The Lazy Daze Caravan Club *ALTERNATE CB CHANNEL IS 7* (seven). It is recommended to post a note of it on the inside of a cabinet door closest to the CB. Don't rely on your memory!
- In the case of continued outside interference, only the Wagonmaster or designated assistant will announce over CB Channel 30 (several times in-between interfering transmissions) for everyone to go to our *ALTERNATE CHANNEL* (Note: *NO* channel number will be given for privacy reasons; hence the justification for posting *CHANNEL 7* on an easy to find note!)
- Because not everyone may be near the CB to hear this important announcement; it is every Lazy Dazers responsibility to inform those that may not have heard the transmission, to inform them to go to the *ALTERNATE CHANNEL* this is where word of mouth works best. The same applies when the call is given if and when we return to our regular Channel 30.

It is also suggested that <u>only</u> if there are extended conversation between Lazy Dazers that another channel be used.—*IMPORTANT*: please make sure you return to Channel 30 after the conversation has ended. It is essential that you keep your CB tuned to Channel 30 in case of an emergency. The Safety Team will not hear you if you transmitted from a different channel. It's a good idea to check your *volume*, *squelch* and *channel location* periodically while in camp to insure you hear important notifications.



Christmas in Live Oak



Tech Talk Article 29 SlimLine 3rd Brake Light 01/2008

An additional or 3rd Brake Light has been standard safety lighting on automobiles and light trucks since about 1993. Adding a 3rd Brake Light to the "Continental" spare tire cover on the Lazy Daze motor home is a cost effective safety upgrade. The SlimLine #253-4500 by Innovative Lighting is a good choice and offers a Left and Right Turn Signal option. It has 11 bright red LEDs under a clear plastic housing that is about 16 inches long and 21/2 inches high when installed with the chrome plastic ring as shown below:

The SlimLine #253-4500 has four wires. The "Running Light" Brown wire powers the center LED and the two outside LEDs. The "Left Turn" Yellow wire powers the 4 LEDs that are just to the left of the light center line. The "Right Turn" Green wire powers the 4 LEDs that are just to the right of the light center line. The "Ground" White wire completes the circuit.

I did not want the "Running Light" LEDs to be lit when the headlights are on as I want to "surprise" the driver behind when I step on the brake or use the turn signal. I used a Bosch type automotive "relay" to turn on the 3 "Running Light" LEDs only when both the Left and Right Turn Signal LEDs are lit. Next month's Tech Talk Article 30 will detail



the installation of the relay. Using the relay turns on all 11 LEDs when either the brakes are applied or the "Emergency Flasher" is activated.



The optimum location for the 3rd Brake Light is centered and as high as possible. On the floor plans that store the spare tire under tire cover, the ends of the mounting screws could rub on the spare tire. I placed a "ball" of putty on my spare tire and closed the tire cover. I pressed on the tire cover to get it to close. The "ball" of putty was deformed to "pancake" about 1/8 of an inch thick. So to protect the spare tire, the light can be mounted midway between the horizontal "pin stripe" and the oval "LD" decal. This will put the two screws down into the rim area of the spare tire. When drilling the 5/8 inch diameter hole for the SlimLine wires, it is important to note that the wires are off center on the backside of the light.

HEALTH AND SAFETY SUGGESTIONS TO INCLUDE IN YOUR NEW YEAR'S RESOLUTIONS

Schedule an annual medical examination. As a memory jogger, suggest you do this on your birthday each year.

Give some critical thought to your nutrition practices. Avoid junk foods and eat more fruits and vegetables. Keep fresh items on hand instead of chips, crackers and cookies. (Consider individual needs.)

Call on CB Channel 30

CODE RED: FIRE/GAS LEAK

CODE BLUE: MEDICAL

PLEASE Do Not Use the CB Until
The ALL CLEAR Is Sounded

Exercise three times a week for at least 30 minutes as your physical condition permits. Never sit longer than an hour without standing and stretching.

Keep Medical Information form in freezer compartment of your R.V. Refrigerator. Keep it up to date when changes occur in medications, physician's name and phone number, and names of persons to notify in case of emergency.

While in camp, store a key to your rig in unlocked exterior compartment such as refrigerator or hot water heater. Do this in case an emergency requires that your rig be moved when you are out of camp.

Do not exceed 5 MPH while driving in camp, especially when roads are dusty.

If you leave camp in a vehicle other than your rig, advise fellow campers of your destination, or post info on your person indicating where your rig is camped. These measures are important in accident emergencies.

When departing camp, leave C.B. on until outside of camp limits. Do this so we can contact you with necessary messages.

We were on our trip for 62 days. We only paid for overnight camping 10 nights....two of the overnights were a double-night stay...Sourdough Campground in Tok, Alaska and Lulu Belle in Valdez, Alaska.

Total lodging for this trip.......\$134.00.

Total gas...... About 1100 gallons

Lowest price for gas...\$2.62 gallon. Bellingham, Washington

Highest prices for gas...\$5.29 a gallon (purchased by the liter) in Dawson City, Yukon Territory

Average mileage...10 mpg (we did not have a tow vehicle)

New windshield...\$230.00 (only damage/problem on entire trip)

10992.8 miles of pure enjoyment!

Every evening after finding our camping spot for the night, I sat down and created a journal w/pictures about the day's journey. This journal was sent out each day to about 100 people who were living the trip through our pictures and descriptions. The journal ended up being 500 pages in length. If you would like to read the journal, we will have CDs available at the next few caravans. Trying to put a two-month trip with so much beauty and experiences into a 1 ½ page document is a tough job and does not begin to convey what we experienced. We love sharing our story with anyone who is considering a trip to Alaska.

OUR TRIP TO WASHINGTON D.C.

After a year's planning we departed for the east coast directly from the Tehachapi Caravan on Sunday, September 30 on our great adventure to Washington DC. We traveled east along Interstate 40 then up 44 to 70 covering 400 to 500 miles a day and over the next week we passed through Williams, Arizona, Santa Rosa New Mexico, the Texas Panhandle, Oklahoma, Missouri, Indiana, Ohio, Pennsylvania, West Virginia and finally arrived in Maryland. It took us seven days to make it cross country taking time off to visit the Indianapolis 500 Speedway Museum and ride around the actual race track. We also stopped in Dayton, Ohio to tour the Air Force Museum. The highlight of this stop was the display of all of the previous Air Force One aircraft you can walk through. As a base to tour the D.C. area we stayed at the Cherry Hill RV Park in College Park Maryland about 30 minutes from the capital. This RV Park has a lady work camper that gives a daily seminar that provides excellent information on touring the area and the available tour packages. The park has a bus stop where you can catch the Muni bus to connect to the Metro Line or take the Gray Line bus that takes you to the Union Station in Washington DC to connect with your tour bus and guides. We never had to move our rig during our entire stay as the bus stop was only 50 yards from our campsite. The tickets, reservations and transportation were all handled right at the park office. This worked out great. We stayed at the Cherry Hill RV park for a week and during this time we toured all of the Washington DC area, the monuments, Arlington, Mr. Vernon, Gettysburg, the Smithsonian, the Capitol building, and of course the White House. Luck was with us the day we went to see the White House. We got to tour the White House gardens and grounds as the president's Marine Band provided musical accompaniment. This tour is offered only two days each year and the day we went happened to be one of those days. The weather was beautiful for the trip east and the whole time we were in DC but our luck with the weather ran out on the way home. We hit a severe weather outbreak coming west in Indiana (Weather Channel said it was the worst severe weather outbreak for October they had records for since 1955) with high winds, severe thunderstorms and tornado watches so we held up two days in Terre Haute until the fronts went through. The rest of the trip home was punctuated (Continued on Page 14)

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by high winds, not particularly pleasant but manageable in an LD. This was quite an adventure for us. We covered 6016 miles in 28 days and the rig ran beautifully. It was rather hard to come home, but Zoe is still gainfully employed and had to report back to work – bummer. We can't wait to get back on the road again, but next time for a more extended period.
